Olympic fever is growing by the minute, but Britain's long search for a Wimbledon tennis champion continues. We do, however, have a British winner of the Tour de France!

The transfer of the Journal from Human Kinetics to Routledge has been a complex process, but we hope you will be receiving your first copies very soon. We are grateful to John Russell, Charlene Weaving and Emily Ryall for all their efforts during this process.

In less than two months, we will be gathering in Porto for the 40th annual conference of IAPS. The conference will be hosted by the Faculty of Sport at the University of Porto between the 12th and 15th of September hot on the heels of London's Olympic and Paralympic Games. We have had a very encouraging response to the calls for abstracts and the programme will consist of keynotes by Lev Kreft and Pam Sailors as well as Professor Jorge Bento and Tomaz Morais from Portugal.

The Association is very grateful to Professor Teresa Lacerda, Professor João Lima and their colleagues at the Faculty of Sport at the University of Porto for hosting and organizing the conference. The Social and Cultural programme look fantastic too so if you have not registered or booked accommodation please go to the conference website where you will find all the necessary details. At the moment we have 106 accepted abstracts in English, 49 accepted abstracts in Portuguese & Spanish and a panel discussion led by Ron Welters. I want to thank Jesus Ilundain, Conference Chair, and Sarah Teetzel, Masami Sekine, Joan Forry and Dennis Hemphill the other members of the Program Committee, for their efforts in putting together an excellent program that promises to be intellectually gratifying and stimulating.

I also would like to take this opportunity to solicit agenda items for the forthcoming Annual Business Meeting. In said meeting, the results of the election, the recipients of honors and awards, and the location of next year's annual conference will be announced. I am very pleased that there is a full slate of exceptional candidates for the available positions and I want to thank all of them for their willingness to serve IAPS. Many of our members have presented and contributed to philosophy of sport Symposia at the ICSEMIS pre Olympic congress in Glasgow 19-24th July. Mike McNamee delivered a keynote address on behalf of IAPS at the Convention.

News from The Journal of the Philosophy of Sport

The first issue of 2012 went to press at the end of June, which is just over a month later than has been usual in the past. Members should receive hard copies of the *JPS* shortly (and may perhaps have received them by now). The delays were predictable given the various coordination and production problems that arose with the transfer to the new publishers (Taylor and Francis/Routledge). Despite the delays, I am pleased with how the transfer has worked out. Authors report that the copy-editing and the process of reviewing page proofs went smoothly. As well, once the papers have been put through this process, they are immediately published on-line, and in fact the articles for the May 2012 issue have been available electronically for a couple of months now. A welcome additional feature is that backlogged articles (i.e., that have been accepted for publication but for which there is not room in the issue that follows their acceptance) will be available on-line immediately after they have been copy-edited. Subscribers will notice a new cover design for the journal ([click here](#)). Carwyn Jones and I thought that this would be appropriate to mark the change in publishers, and we worked with Taylor and Francis/Routledge to select the new design. Comments welcome.

More generally, it is fair to say that from an editor's and author's perspective, the transition to a new publisher has been seamless. I expect that the bugs regarding publishing of the hard copy of the journal will be worked out for the fall issue, but we will see.

Here is the current (albeit tentative) table of contents for the fall issue. This includes the confirmed articles for this issue. It is possible there may be one or two additions. Special thanks go to Teresa Lacerda for guest editing the special section on aesthetics and sport. Professor Lacerda has managed to collect a diverse range of thoughtful articles on this topic, which I expect will rejuvenate interest in this area of sport philosophy. As always, suggestions for special section topics are welcome.

2012 IAPS Conference –

IAPS Conference Chair, Jesús Ilundáin-Agurruza,

It is with great pleasure that I report on another very successful run up to the annual conference. We had another windfall of great proposals that matches last year's impressive numbers. As of July 11 there are 151 presentations apportioned among the three official languages, English, Portuguese, and Spanish. There were well over 100 proposed abstracts with a high overall quality. The total number of abstracts accepted was 106 (unfortunately some colleagues whose proposal was accepted will not be able to join us this time). To this we must add the Portuguese and Spanish presentations, which number 49. Of note is that there will be many new faces, and again a considerable number of students, 24 presenting in English and 18 in Portuguese or Spanish. Minus overlaps of those presenting in English and Spanish, this comes to 41 students, or just about 22% of the total number of presenters. A good reason to smile.

There is a tantalizing variety of original presentations... this means that the primary challenge and only downside will be having to choose among the presentations! In the near future, and pending last-minute changes, the book of abstracts will be up online.

The onsite organizers and conference chairs Teresa Lacerda and João Lima, and their able secretariat team (Susana Soares, Luísa Gagliardini Graça, and Rebeca Coehlo), have put together a fantastic program. Besides the exciting program of talks and academic and official business, which this year runs from Wednesday afternoon to Saturday evening, there are extraordinary cultural and social opportunities.

- On Friday the 14, in the afternoon, there will be a walk in the old part of Porto, some wine tasting, and a nice sail in the Douro River aboard a Rabelo boat. You have already paid for this, so make sure you show up!
- On Sunday the 16, there is an excursion to the Douro Valley via mini-bus. This one comes at a very reasonable price. Sign up early!
