so many young scholars hungry to discuss philosophical and ethical issues in sport, which is a good sign for any association and its sustainability, and let us not forget that this was in part thanks to IAPS financial support. I would especially like to thank Matija Škerbić from the University of Zagreb and his organizing team for preparing such a welcoming environment and well-organized event. Even though many of us did not avoid Covid-19, it did not prevent us from meeting and interacting, and so far as I know, there were no serious consequences.

## SECRETARY-TREASURER REPORT

## Summary

- 1. Our membership is at a ten-year high! Membership revenue nets us about \$10,000 each calendar year. Demographics have shifted slightly, although this is usually dependent on conference location. The United States, Japan, Canada, and the United Kingdom account for over half of our membership.
- 2. IAPS remains in good fiscal health. Details are below.
- 3. Our investments are up \$7,150 over last year and roughly \$18,000 over the initial investment of \$100,000 in 2017. In August of 2021, we were at our highpoint of \$128,000. We are still recovering from the recent economic downturn, but there is no indication we should change our investment strategy.
- 4. I continue to work with a group of scholars seeking to create a new kinesiology federation.
- 5. The IAPS Student Travel Fund receives minimal donations. You can donate at any time here.
- 6. Remember that IAPS memberships are on <u>a calendar year</u>. You can purchase your 2024 IAPS membership after <u>November 1, 2023</u>. If you are a member in good standing, you should receive an automatic email reminder. You can access the membership portal here: <u>IAPS Membership Portal</u>. Through the portal, you can also make any changes in address, email, or other contact information.



#### NEWS FROM THE EDITOR OF THE JOURNAL OF THE PHILOSOPHY OF SPORT

## **Current Issue**

As I write this report the November 2023 issue (*JPS* 50-03) is in final preparation and will soon be published online and hard copies will be mailed to IAPS members.

## **Distribution**

As far as I know, no active IAPS member is currently missing back issues but distribution problems do occur every so often. If you have questions or problems, please let me know. Please do not attempt to resolve this issue yourself by contacting Taylor & Francis offices directly—that only complicates the issue. The first thing to clarify is whether you have kept your IAPS membership current; if your membership lapses you will not receive your issues. If you have kept your membership up to date but did not receive your issue(s), I will work on that. It takes a little time, but we have always been able to get members their missing issues. November 2023 has not yet been mailed.

## Submissions

Submissions continue to be strong. The journal is receiving research on a great variety of topics in the philosophy of sport and from an ever-widening community of serious scholars working in our field. Today I received submission number 100 for the calendar year 2023, which puts us on pace to break by a considerable margin the previous high of 107 submissions in the year 2020. In the March 2024 IAPS Newsletter, after the 2023 calendar year statistics are complete, I will provide a more detailed breakdown of the submission and acceptance numbers.

## **Special Issues and Special Sections**

There are two Special Issues in the works. The <u>first</u> is an issue on "Nature Sports," guest-edited by Kevin Krein, and scheduled to be published as the July 2024 issue (*JPS* 51-02). The *JPS* Editorial Board approved the proposal from Kevin Krein last fall and the CFP went out shortly after. A limited number of proposals have been selected and the authors are currently at work on the first drafts of their papers. The <u>second</u> is an issue on "The Sport Philosophy of J.S. Russell," scheduled to be published as the July 2025 issue (*JPS* 52-02). This Special Issue was recently approved by the *JPS* Editorial Board, and is tentatively scheduled to be published as the July 2024 issue. I will edit this Special Issue. <u>Further details and a CFP are forthcoming</u>.

As you know by now, there is a link on the journal website that explains the process for Special Issue/Special Section proposals. Members of the Editorial Board discuss these proposals at the Editorial Board meetings at our annual conference or by email throughout the year. Special Sections are not only a good way to do focused studies on timely topics, which then become excellent resources for future scholarly work, but they are also excellent opportunities to bring new authors and new perspectives into our Association. In a Special

Issue/Special Section there are usually some invited papers but, in addition, the Editorial Board decided that every Special Issue/Special Section will also have a CFP so as to give everyone an opportunity to participate.

### JPS Website Links

Specifically, the link will have information on four areas of interest:
- Citations: Impact Factor and Best Quartile, CiteScore, SNIP, SJR, 5 Year Impact Factor.
- Usage: total article views in the last full calendar year.
- **Speed**: average days from submission to first decision; average days from acceptance to online publication.
- Acceptance rate.



## **Website**

Website traffic from September 2022 through August 2023 has been mostly consistently with previous years. As in previous years, the month of March saw the highest traffic.

Below are several visual representations of our traffic data:







Over the past year, I have maintained the website and performed a few minor updates to enhance the navigability of the site and its organization. In the future, the organization may want to consider if WordPress is still the best way to manage the website—there may be easier-to-use or more flexible options. WordPress is often significantly impaired, presumably by site maintenance. For example, I am often unable to edit our site because the host is down, pages will not load, pages will not save, et cetera. In many cases, edits that I make to the site simply do not update and I have to try again at a later time to make edits. This is painstaking and annoying, but probably does not warrant a changing hosts. This paragraph was not altered in any way from the 2022 report.

#### Social Media

IAPS currently has 924 Twitter followers, up from 905 in 2022 and 865 in 2021. IAPS Twitter activity is typically steady throughout the year, with the most significant activity in September, during the annual conference. In general, Twitter is a useful tool that seems to reach a significant number of users, many of whom are not members of the organization. IAPS has both a Facebook Page and Facebook Group. The page currently has 292 followers. That is up from 263 in September of 2022. Posting on the page is limited to the administrator (me) and most posts convey information about the conference or the organization. The posts typically reach between 100-200 people, though at times the reach extends to 300-400. Neither the Facebook Page or Group is very active. Social media could likely be leveraged more for the organization, as a way to promote the conference and Journal and to recruit new members. In 2023 I also recorded three podcast- style conversations for the IAPS YouTube page. The conversations were with Bill Morgan, Scott Kretchmar, and Pam Sailors and the can all be viewed here: <a href="https://tinyurl.com/2yjn2sem">https://tinyurl.com/2yjn2sem</a>. I expect to continue this practice going forward.

The HAFS committee worked to present a proposal for a formal policy on financial requests by members to the organizations. Following comments from the executive committee, a final amended version was resubmitted in July 2023. The policy, if approved by the executive committee, will formalize the process, procedures, amounts, and dates for requesting funds from IAPS.

**Result of discussion**: Send back to committee for review of the raised suggestions.

## PROPOSED AMENDMENTS

## The Value of an DEIB Committee to IAPS (shortened)

The IAPS DEIB committee would devote time and energy to examining IAPS and sport philosophy with an eye for continually building a more inclusive, diverse, and just scholarly community. It would continuously cultivate a paradigm of equitable, inclusive, and multi-pronged scholarly discovery to strengthen IAPS and sport philosophy.

The committee would serve in an advisory capacity to the President, Executive Council, and Association itself. The committee would provide advice by engaging in a regular self-study of IAPS from a social justice lens, seeking improvement and offering recommendations to the executive committee and membership at large. It would offer ways to create a better, more just, and ultimately stronger organization.

## Overview of Proposed Amendment(s)

The ad hoc EDI committee proposes the permanent addition of a Diversity, Equity, Inclusion, and Belonging Committee to IAPS. The suggested membership and duties include:

**Membership:** The Diversity, Equity, Inclusion and Belonging Committee shall consist of five Standard, Sustaining, or Emeritus Members of the Association on rotating three-year terms. Three shall be elected by a vote of the membership of the Association. Two shall be appointed by the President, in consultation with the Executive Council, in an effort to foster diversity, broadly speaking, within the Committee. In an election year, one or two shall be elected and one member shall be appointed. The Chair of the Committee shall be chosen by the members of the Committee. The Chair shall serve as an Officer of the Association.

**Duties**: It shall be the responsibility of the Committee to study issues related to diversity, equity, inclusion, and belonging (DEIB) within the Association. The Committee shall undertake a continual and sustained

effort to assess the structure, organization, and culture of the Association in regard to DEIB. The committee will provide a yearly report to the executive council highlighting any issues and recommendations. The Committee shall make recommendations to the Executive Council and to the Membership on ways to enhance DEIB in the Association, including, but not limited to, suggesting initiatives to create a culture of belonging and creating opportunities for advancing DEIB through policy changes and new grants and awards. The Committee shall also consider the ways that publications of the Association, including the *Journal of the Philosophy of Sport*, and the annual conference can support DEIB initiatives. The Committee shall also act in an advisory capacity on other issues concerning DEIB and offer recommendations to the President and Executive Council of the Association.

The formation of this committee requires amending the IAPS Constitution in four ways (please see suggested changes in red):

1. Article IV (Officers), Section 1: Adding DEIB committee chair to paragraph describing the Officers of the Association.

The Officers of the Association shall be a President, a Conference Chair, an Elections Chair, a Secretary-Treasurer, a Journal Editor, a Newsletter Editor, four Members-at-Large, Honors, Awards, and Future Sites Committee Chair, Diversity, Equity, Inclusion and Belonging Committee Chair, and a Webmaster.

- 2. Article IV (Officers), Section 1: Addition of DEIB committee chair paragraph, with term length. The Diversity, Equity, Inclusion, and Belonging Committee Chair will be appointed by the DEIB committee for a renewable one-year term.
- 3. Article IV (Officers): Addition of Section 11, which describes the role of the DEIB Committee Chair. Section 11: Diversity, Equity, Inclusion, and Belonging Chair shall

undertake a continual and sustained effort to assess the structure, organization, and culture of the Society in regard to Diversity, Equity, and Belonging (DEIB) and provide a yearly report to the executive council highlighting any issues and recommendations.

make recommendations to the Executive Council and to the Membership on ways to enhance DEIB in the Association

4. Article VI (Committees): Addition of Section 5, which describes the membership and role of the DEIB committee.

Section 5: The Diversity, Equity, Inclusion and Belonging Committee shall consist of five Standard, Sustaining, or Emeritus Members of the Association on rotating three-year terms. Three shall be elected by a vote of the membership of the Association. Two shall be appointed by the Preinsident, in consultation with the Executive Council, in an effort to foster diversity, broadly speaking, within the Committee. In an election year, one or two members shall be elected, and one member shall be appointed. The Chair of the Committee shall be chosen by the members of the Committee. It shall be the responsibility of the Committee to study issues related to diversity, equity, inclusion, and belonging (DEIB) within the Association with regard to the structure, organization, and culture of the Association. This self-study shall include but is not limited to, ways that the Association publications, including the Journal of the Philosophy of Sport, the annual conference, and new initiatives, such as policy changes, grants, and awards, can enhance DEIB within the Association. The Committee shall make recommendations to the Executive Council and to the Membership on ways to enhance DEIB in the Association and act in an advisory capacity on other issues concerning DEIB.
